Week Beginning: 25.3.24



Dear Parents and guardians,

Tables dressed in the purest white sheets; fine candles strategically positioned on each desk; the Sedar plates and wine glasses arranged with precision.

All was ready for the annual Passover meal to mark the Jewish people's flight from their Egyptian captors.

Bitter herbs to remember the trauma, brine-dipped flatbread to symbolise the tears of the thousands, and a mix of chopped apples, representing mortar used to build Egypt, were all plated up.

In groups, the children role played the events leading to the Exodus of the Israelites from slavery.

The children then learned about Moses' martyred role in freeing the enslaved, and god's 10-plague infliction that the Pharoah and his people were subjected to for welching on deals.

Maths

Using images and models, the children made sense of how to turn mixed numbers into improper fractions and vice versa.

Then, came the task of putting these skills to use. The children challenged, and persevered to solve a variety of searching tricky problems.

They have worked very hard this term learning their times tables. Their improving accuracy is a testament to the effort they are all putting into their work.

Geography

What does your shopping trolley tell about you? Dragon fruit from Thailand, a mango from Brazil, and bread made from Canadian wheat, and what about the Argentinian beef steak or the lamb from New Zealand? This week, the children explored food miles and the problems this is potentially stacking for the environment.
